


# Unchained



## <sup>(1)</sup> 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> June "History Alive: A Journey Through Time" Fort Lytton National Park, Brisbane. Story by Lyle Paull.

This annual event covers almost 2000 years of history starting from Ancient Rome and includes re-enactments, camp displays and historical talks. This year the Club was invited to attend after member from History Alive spotted Kaye and me on our replica tricycles in the Ipswich Festival night time street parade and we were asked if our club would be interested in joining in.

Kaye, Shane and I arrived early Saturday and set up a marquee and an array of bicycles in time for the public opening at 10am. Fort Lytton was transformed into an amazing sight with all the eras including Medieval through to WWII. We were joined by Hamish, Janine, Andrew and Doris during the day. Every camp had to look in period, right down to the tent ropes and timber pegs. At the end of the first day, we had to wait for the public to leave at 4pm before we could set up our modern tents and settle in for the night.

Early Sunday morning, the three of us ventured out for a ride down around the refinery then back to pack up our modern tents ready for the public to arrive again. During this event we were dressed in period outfits and were free to cycle around the site, dodging  $14^{\text{th}}$  century jousting tournaments and canon firings, mingling with roman legionaries, pre-barbarians and knights. Well worth the experience and no doubt we will be back next year with a period camp set up.

# ① 21th April to 26th April The Shearers' Ride Broken Hill to Bourke, NSW: Part 1 By Lyle Paull and Kaye Vockenson

The notion of cycling beside the Darling River on 100 year old bicycles was inspired by a road trip from Adelaide to Brisbane when we were bringing home (yet another) carload of rusting old bicycles. Lyle decided that retracing the route travelled by shearers from the early 1890's through to the 1920's would be a fun thing to do. And so was born the great Broken Hill to Bourke Shearers Ride.

A number of people expressed a keen interest but ultimately we had 7 riders who were able to join us with 3 back up drivers. The group comprised Lyle on an unknown 1908 fixed wheel, Kaye on a 1910 Swastika coaster brake, Hamish on a 1915 BSA coaster brake track bike, Terry on 1920 Dart coaster brake, Richard on a 1912 BSA free wheel track bike, Brendan on a 1920s police bike coaster brake, and Rob on a 2008 Mongoose. Jude, Keith and Sheryl supported our group with 3 back up vehicles and finally there was Argus, the black Labrador.

All bright eyed and bushy tailed, we gathered in Broken Hill on 21 April, some having travelled from country Victoria and the remainder from the greater SE Queensland corner. We spent our in time in Broken Hill sorting gear, assembling bikes, stocking the tucker boxes, loading the trailer and getting to know each other.



After posing for photos for the Barrier Daily Truth newspaper, we set off on the undulating sealed road towards Menindee Lakes, on the way camping overnight under the river gums by the broad sandy Stephens Creek. Another 50km the following day saw us rolling into Menindee Lakes Caravan Park after a lunch break at the entrance to the fishing village of Sunset Strip. Our grassy campsite overlooked part of the lake system and we were treated to the first of our flaming outback sunsets. The communal campfire was the place to gather that evening to meet other travellers and garner some local knowledge of our route ahead.

On Day 3 we hit the unsealed road, testing our skills and balance on the sandy surface. Many travellers were camped along this scenic network of lakes. All riders had a crash course in sand drifting for the first 15 km. Following local advice, we took a short cut across levee banks which led us to the hard packed clay surface on the eastern side of the river. Over the next 65km we settled into our journey and began our pattern of regrouping every 20km. Our back up crew would travel ahead, find shady spot amongst the blue bush and get the billy on the boil. Argus would ensure no food scraps were left behind.



At one point we found ourselves inadvertently cycling down a private airstrip as we passed by Tintinallogy Station. The manager, who happened to be passing by, pulled us over, set us right, at the same time advising us of a turn off ahead that led to an idyllic riverside campsite overlooked by a tall windmill. Here we settled in for the night around another campfire. Unbeknown to us, the few sprinkles of overnight rain were going to bring us to a halt the next day.

Day 4 started out at a fast clip on the smooth hard clay surface until gradually, the increasingly wet surface mud started to stick to our tyres. With each roll of the wheel, more mud layered on until Lyle's bike with its minimal wheel clearance, was the first to lock up with the sticky stuff. Lyle optimistically mounted the spare bike (1920s Lewis). One by one the riders succumbed to the mud until it was decided to load the bikes onto to trailer and high tail it to our next camp, just outside Wilcannia. We made it but not without having to dig the sticky pure clay out of the wheel arches of a couple of the vehicles.

In Wilcannia we sought local knowledge on the route ahead and received widely varying advice. That evening, some of us caught the courtesy bus to the much touted Wilcannia Golf Club for dinner where we enjoyed a slap up meal and Kaye came home with a generous meat tray prize.


