
- the club's open Facebook page including this shot of a decorative cycle path entrance.
- Lyle is thinking of using historical bikes to re-enact early shearers' routes and ride from Broken Hill along the Darling River to Bourke (river road). It will be about 500klm and he intends to ride a 1900 1920s bike (but a 1940 50s bike would suffice) set up for the period look. Currently the plan is for 500klms on 98% dirt roads over 10days. Anyone interested should contact Lyle or stay tuned here!

- A new book launched since the last newsletter "Bicycling through time: The Farren Collection" by Paul and Charlie Farren. From the blurb:

Paul Farren claims he and his wife Charlie have around 85 percent of the pre-1900 bicycles in Australia - all under one roof in a Melbourne warehouse-cum-museum. Thirty years of hunting them down and collecting has resulted in one of the most impressive early bike collections in the world. It includes 160 pre-1900 bicycles, including hobby horses, boneshakers and Penny Farthings, as well as early 20th-century models. The collection charts the development of the bicycle, which foreshadows the invention of the motor car in many surprising ways. It also shows wider social change and the role the bicycle has played in female emancipation, war and its progression from plaything of the wealthy to utilitarian mode of transport of the masses.

What a day!! Arrived at Shane's workplace where we assembled. Those who were transporting their bikes by vehicle left, and a bit later those of us who elected to ride departed for the show grounds. Sneaky darn speed bump took me by surprise along the way after a big haul up to the railway overpass.

The street parade was an interesting experience. A mixture of riding, walking and coasting on the step. Whilst enthusiastic, the general public can be a bit thoughtless. Some made themselves inadvertent traffic hazards.

Next was a break for refreshments, and a bit of a look around for those who cared to. We next headed down to the main arena for our historical laps. The group held together for a couple or turns around the oval, and after that drifted into a scatter right round the oval track. Ju...st as my legs were complaining, the pace went up a notch. The fool on the original bike tried in vain to keep up. After another two laps at speed, the calves were saying "stop that or I'll really hurt you". So I did.

The more intrepid (and younger and fitter) continued, doing a two lap 'race'. And, I might add looked quite impressive too. I have no idea if anyone was judged to be a

Of special note were two baby sized pennies, ridden by quite young kids*. They were very persistent. That oval must have seemed endless to such youthful eyes. The young boy deserves extra commendation; he fell off a number of times but just picked himself up and continued bravely on.

We then moved back up to the marshaling area for the street parade, secured the bikes and broke for lunch and more Ekka-seeing. At about 3:00pm people began to drift homewards, and my legs were so glad to have the weight taken off. All together a great day in excellent company. I expected a really good night's sleep that night.

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Importing antique bicycles from the USA - 1901 women's Tribune and 1890's men's Spalding safety bicycles By Lyle Paull

These two bikes were purchased from Sue Fox who lives in San Francisco, USA. Sue, purchased these bikes from the original owner of an exclusive Hamptons estate in New York. They came straight out of the barn and were therefore the great condition for their age. The family was old wealth, and partied with the very famous families of old USA money like the Roosevelts and Vanderbilts. Sue also purchased a 1922 car called a Briggs & Stratton Flyer in amazing original condition, from this same barn. It is a 5 wheeled car which looks like a sled with 5 bicycle tires and an engine mounted on the 5th wheel. You drop the wheel, and the car goes. Pick up the wheel, and the car slows. The Tribune was on Ebay USA for only a short time when I discovered that Sue had another bike, the Spalding, for sale. I arranged to buy both bikes so Sue organised a local bike shop in San Francisco to partly dismantle and pack them in one large cardboard bike box. Once Sue notified me of the freight costs, I waited for her to send an invoice. But there was only silence with Sue not answering her emails for 4 months or so. Eventually she contacted me with a total price which I paid through Paypal. Then followed another long wait for the bikes to be sent by ship. Finally after 15 months, much negotiation, waiting patiently and paying as much as the bikes were worth in freight and charges, the real drama started once they arrived in Australia. The trouble began when I was advised that the ship went to Melbourne and was not continuing to Brisbane. So I had to pay for shipping from Melbourne to Brisbane on another ship which was as expensive as the shipping costs from the USA.

In addition, I was sent the wrong paperwork from the Stevedores which left me with no choice but to hire a local broker to fast track the paperwork. Luckily the ship was 3 days late so at least I did not incur storage fees at the Port of Brisbane. Before release, the bikes were fumigated due to the wooden rims and of course I had to pay extra government fees and charges. After all that, I still had to take time off work to pick the bikes up from the Port. Initial cost of both bikes was \$1500 and I ended up paying a similar amount to finally have the bikes in my possession. What a turn out!!

1890's men's Spalding, large size frame all original wood rims, suspension seat post and I have added tubular tyres. 1901 women' chainless Tribune with free wheel and coaster brake, original tubular front tyre and wooden rims.

Sunday 1st Logan Village Settlers' Day


10 am parade through the streets of Logan Village and finishing at the Logan Village Green in Wharf Street. Shane coordinating.

Not a very Penny-friendly event, but a major date for safety cyclists due largely to the "Robbie McEwan's Grand Fondo" on Sunday 29th. The Grand Fondo is a 117km cycling tour for the enthusiast (not a race) across the Gold Coast Hinterland. There is also the 50km Piccolo Fondo or 25km Tourist Course.

October

23rd & 24th Qld Penny Farthing and Historical Cycle Carnival (proposed - all elements are under discussion)

Saturday

Morning street parade- Vintage bikes and riders in period dress. Pedestrians in period dress. Local vintage car and motor cycle enthusiasts' may also fit the occasion.

Afternoon (or at conclusion of parade) penny stack followed by photography and presentation of awards for "best presented rider and bike".

Sunday

Race day and recreational rides! Options include:

- Hall to Hall ride/race. Brisbane- Sandgate. Lord Mayor to start, Victoria Newtown to greet finishing riders. (Brisbane to Sandgate was a well-worn track in the 1800s)
- Sunday peninsular loop road ride
- Century ride. Sandgate to Landsborough and return (Old Gympie Road)
- A series of races on the streets of Sandgate.

As road closures are the main expense, routes under consideration for the first year work on minimal road closures and the use of volunteer marshals. This event does not need to be a huge blockbuster right out of the gate. It might be best to start with a single day and a simple parade and stack. Over time as the club grows and the profile of the event is able to draw more sponsorship, it will be possible to build complexity and add

elements. Better to do something a bit bigger than the stack and do it well.
